**Ian Wise QC** was for many years the head of Doughty Street’s public law team. He has been involved in a number of the most high profile public law cases in recent years, especially those dealing with duties owed by public bodies to children. These include the leading cases in relation to duties to homeless teenagers (*R (G) v Southwark LBC*) and age assessment (*R (A) v Croydon LBC*), both of which were won in the House of Lords/Supreme Court. Ian’s practice covers a wide range of public law areas and he specialises in healthcare, local government, (including community care and education) and children’s law. Ian was lead author for chapter 1, ‘Introduction’ and general editor of this book.

**Steve Broach** is a public lawyer focusing on the rights of children and disabled or otherwise vulnerable adults in cases concerning health, education, social care and related issues.
